# "SHADES OF

Last week-end's results threw the competition of the first five into the melting pot. However, it looks as if the 1988 premiership could have the same final showdown as in 1987—a Souths v. Lakes Grand Final. Souths have now put together 7 straight wins and came from behind against Wests to knock the Rosellas out of the five.

Lakes have the second best set of straight wins currently with five, their comfortable win put them ahead of Centrals on percentage and in second spot. Is it '87 all over again? There are some top games in the last three rounds and the teams that make the five will have earned their places.

Cessnock are at home to West on Friday night, the winner in the five, the loser out most probably. Both losers last round, Cessnock right on the bell, Wests beaten comfortably after a good first half.

Both sides have the talent, the desire to win—performance on the 3ht obviously will tell. Could go other way.

Lakes are at home to Maitland. The Pumpkin-pickers have reached their crunch time. One more loss and their 1988 chance are gone. This is the toughest game they have left and is another 'grand final' for them. The Seagulls are in fine form and their rise in the table coincided with the return of Peter Walsh. Lakes are going to be tough at home and the result could see the first team to drop out of the top seven teams that have been challenging for the semi's.

Central go to the coalfields again to play Kurri and need a win desper-ately. Their loss last week to Maitland was expensive as far as their position in the table was concerned. The Bulldogs have become real nuisance value in recent weeks and are keen to finish the season well. With games against Wests and Cessnock to follow, Kurri will be well primed

for a big effort.

South are at home to Macquarie in another major game. The Lions have been a model of consistency this year, with the loss in the opening round being the only really poor effort so far. A loss by the Macquarie Scorpions will probably mean their eliminiation from the semi's, but after some very ordinary performances lately, came back really well to defeat Cessnock last round. Souths, however, have all the advantages and should win comfortably.

The remaining game is between orths and Waratah. Both clubs Norths and Waratah. are looking towards 1989, rebuilding in different ways. Norths have battled out the season well, all things considered. Waratah will have too much going for them in this game and will win well.
