PLAYERS OF YESTERYEAR

LES JOHNS

Twelve Test appearances for Australia

Les Johns was a footballing freak, with the ability to turn the tide of a game in seconds. Only a string of injuries prevented him from establishing himself as one of the all-time great full-backs, in the mould of Clive Churchill or Howard Hallett.

Johns began to be noticed as a 19-year-old playing for the South Newcastle club and was chosen to represent Newcastle in the Country championship and Country Seconds in the annual clash with City. He was again selected for Country next year, this time in firsts but had to pull out because of injury, to be replaced by another great talent, Graeme Langlands.

In 1962, Johns achieved inter-

national prominence with a great performance in the Newcastle side which beat the British tourists. Next year, he joined Canterbury-Bankstown and immediately established himself as a star of the Sydney competition. He was chosen to play in the Tests against the touring Kiwis but was forced out injured and, as a result, found himself playing second-fiddle to Ken Thornett on the ensuing Kangaroo tour.

Johns did manage a Test against the Frenchmen in 1964 but had to retire at half-time with a damaged ankle. His only real run of top-line success was on the 1967 Kangaroo tour, when he played all six Tests, and on two visits to New Zealand (1965 and 1969) when he appeared in all Tests.
